## CALL MR. ROBESON: A life, with songs.

## Written and Performed by Tayo Aluko, with Jean-Baptiste Richon, Piano The Regal, Bathgate. Saturday September 6, 2014

Greetings, Welcome. On arrival in Bathgate earlier today, I was out flyering at the Music Festival and was fortunate to get into conversation with two gentlemen who told me a little bit about a band I had just missed - the Newland Concert Band, named after the benefactor of the Old Academy, which is the precursor of the Bathgate Academy. The benefactor of the Old Academy was one John Newland, a slave trader who left money to the people of Bathgate, and who is celebrated annually in a Festival. I gather that there is some unease about such a celebration being held to continually commemorate someone who profited so hugely from such great human misery, but from my perspective at least, it is interesting to be reminded how all-pervasive the legacy of the Trans-Atlantic Slave Trade is, and how fascinating the stories behind contemporary life and culture are, however much some people try to hide or deny its very unpleasant aspects. Positive stories also suffer in the same way, particularly stories of people who have fought to win us the freedoms, rights and benefits that we enjoy today, whether we are Black people or people from ordinary working class backgrounds. One example (which I also learned of today) was that miners in Pumpherston first organised a collection from amongst their ranks to ensure that a doctor could be employed to look after their health, in the days long before the National Health Service was even thought of, at a time when the mine owners, rather like slave traders were more interested in their profits than in the welfare of those that created their wealth. It is my privilege to have found a means of telling another such forgotten story - that of Paul Robeson, who rather like John Newland (but for diametrically opposite reasons) needs to be returned to public consciousness today. At a time when in the eyes of most in power, things like Health and Education seem to be once more less important than profits, and world leaders and the drivers of the world economy celebrate and perpetuate war. people like Robeson are a timely reminder that there are more noble and creative pursuits to follow, and that we can all be generals and soldiers in struggles for peace, justice and human rights, and that we don't have to look far to unearth those hidden stories that can be sources of great inspiration to us in those struggles. I hope you enjoy the show.

Tayo Aluko. Writer, Performer, Producer. Tayo was born in Nigeria, and now lives in Liverpool. He worked previously as an architect and property developer, with a special but as yet frustrated interest in eco-friendly construction. He has fronted orchestras as baritone soloist in concert halls, and has also performed lead roles in such operas and musicals as Nabucco, Kiss Me Kate and Anything Goes. CALL MR ROBESON has won numerous awards at festivals in the UK and Canada, as well as highly favourable reviews in the press - most notably in the Guardian and on BBC Radio 4. He has toured the play around the UK, the United States of America, Canada, Jamaica and Nigeria, and at New York's Carnegie Hall in February 2012 on his 50<sup>th</sup> birthday. He also delivers a lecture/concert called PAUL ROBESON - THE GIANT, IN A NUTSHELL, and another one titled FROM BLACK AFRICA TO THE WHITE HOUSE - a talk about Black Political Resistance, illustrated with spirituals has been performed in three continents. He researched, wrote and narrated to camera a piece on West African History before the Trans-Atlantic Slave Trade, which forms part of the permanent exhibit at Liverpool's International Slavery Museum. His 15minute play, HALF MOON, which also deals with ancient Africa has been performed several times in the UK. He has recently been appointed president of the Birmingham Clarion Singers. He is currently working with The Maltings Theatre, Berwick on a new piece, titled What Happens? featuring the writings of Langston Hughes, to be performed with live jazz accompaniment. He is a current writer on attachment with the Liverpool Everyman and Playhouse theatres.

Jean-Baptiste Richon, Piano and original incidental music. Jean-Baptiste Richon is a Jazz pianist based in Edinburgh. In addition to playing with his own Jazz Trio and the Dajo Jazz duet he has played and toured extensively as a guest keyboard player with Edinburgh-based Gecko3.

Olusola Oyeleye, Director and Dramaturge. Olusola is an award winning writer, director and producer working in opera, music theatre, visual arts and dance. Theatre includes: *Tin* (The Lowry), Ti-Jean and his Brothers (Collective Artistes & Sustained Theatre, Cottesloe), Resident director on Trevor Nunn's West End production of *Porgy and Bess* (Savoy Theatre), staff producer at English National Opera, Spirit of Okin and Sankofa for Adzido Pan African Dance Ensemble, (National & International tours), Coming Up For Air (The Drum & UK tour), The Resurrection of Roscoe Powell (Soho Theatre), The Shelter (RSC Barbican Theatre), Medea (Ariya, Royal National Theatre Studio), The Playground (Polka Theatre, Time Out Critics' Choice Pick of the Year), High Life, (Hampstead Theatre), Maybe Father, (Talawa, Young Vic), Twelfth Night (British Council Tour, Zimbabwe) and Ella, a monodrama about Ella Fitzgerald (Rich Mix). Opera includes: Akin Euba's Orunmila's Voices: Songs from the Beginning of Time (Jefferson's Arts Centre, New Orleans) and Chaka: An Opera in Two Chants with the St. Louis African Chorus, Dido and Aeneas (Tricycle/BAC), God's Trombones (Fairfield Halls) and the second cast revival of Jonathan Miller's production of The Mikado (English National Opera). Olusola has also worked in Ghana, South Africa, Zimbabwe, Nigeria, Hungary and the Czech Republic. She has been a visiting lecturer and Artist at Universities in South Africa and London, and was Head of the Acting Studio at Morley College. Her poetry has been set to music by Akin Euba and performed at both Harvard and Cambridge Universities. She is a Fellow of the Royal Society for the Arts.
