I am privileged to present Darryl Taylor, who I first met and heard sing about five years ago when he was a phenomenal tenor, in Cambridge. He kindly invited me to participate in a conference in his home town of Irvine, California, of music by Black Composers, and I found myself on stage with some phenomenal musicians from all over America. I was as much in awe of them as I am of Darryl, who has since metamorphosed into a countertenor of no less amazing credentials. I am sure you will enjoy his voice, and I hope that one day he will grace the stage in the main hall. Thanks to Raewyn Bailey, who I first worked with years ago in Chester. She has braved an accident and severe pain but has risen to the challenge of playing some very challenging music, as well as composing a new piece and arranging a song for me. I hope you enjoy the evening.

Tayo Aluko was born in Nigeria, and now resides in Liverpool. He worked until recently as an architect and property developer, with a special but as yet frustrated interest in eco-friendly construction. As a baritone, he has sung as soloist in British concert halls accompanied by orchestra, and has also sung in Germany, Ireland and Nigeria. He has performed lead roles in such operas and musicals as Nabucco, Kiss Me Kate and Anything Goes. CALL MR ROBESON won the Argus Angel Award for Artistic Excellence and Best Male Performer Award at the 2008 Brighton Festival Fringe, and two Merit Awards for Excellence in London in 2010. He has performed the play around the UK, the United States of America, Canada and Nigeria. His other piece titled I GOT A HOME IN BARACK: a talk about Black Political Resistance, illustrated with Spirituals has also been performed in three continents. He researched, wrote and narrated to camera a piece on West African History before the Trans-Atlantic Slave Trade, which forms part of the permanent exhibit at Liverpool's International Slavery Museum. A song from his CD, RECALLING ROBESON is featured as the July 2008 song of the month on the Labor Notes website.

Darryl Taylor has sung in concert halls across the United States and Europe, including Weill Recital Hall at Carnegie Hall, the Kennedy Center for the Performing Arts, Royce Hall, Merkin Concert Hall, and Barcelona's Palau de la Mùsica. His numerous tours of Spain have garnered him particular praise. His recordings, Love Rejoices: Songs of H. Leslie Adams (Albany Records), and Dreamer: A Portrait of Langston Hughes (Naxos Records, American Classics Series) have received lavish acclaim. 2006 saw the release of three CDs, Poetry Preludes: Music of Richard Thompson and Fields of Wonder: Songs of Robert Owens, both on Albany Records, and Louis Moreau Gottschalk: Complete Orchestral Works and Escénas Campestres Cubanas with the Grammynominated Hot Springs Festival Orchestra (Naxos Records, American Classics Series). Forthcoming in January 2011 is How Sweet the Sound – a charm of spirituals (Albany Records). A native of Detroit, Michigan, Darryl Taylor holds degrees from the University of Southern California and the University of Michigan. He is a member of Mu Phi Epsilon Music Fraternity and Pi Kappa Lambda National Music Honors Society.
