CALL MR. ROBESON: A life, with songs.

Greetings. I have never hesitated to adopt an air of pride when stating the fact that I am Nigerian. That's a little more difficult today, with the news coming out of my country. Still, I think that probably more good than harm is being done by the total bankruptcy, illegitimacy and unfitness for purpose that our president and his inner circle are displaying for the whole world to see. If there's any justice, his campaign for a new four-year term in the 2015 elections will have been dealt a fatal blow. We however live in an unjust, greedy world, and what with the history of imperialism in Africa and those showing interest in Nigeria now, it is not beyond the realms of possibility that Goodluck Jonathan may be victorious in 2015 (stranger things have happened!) While Nigerians are grateful for the help being offered to resolve the terrible, dangerous situation we find ourselves in (despite the fact that Security received by far the lion's share of our last national budget), the prospect of American, French, British and maybe even Chinese drones, troops and arms on the ground in that part of the world makes some suspect that humanitarian motives may soon be succeeded by (and are maybe masking) commercial and military ones. That is the stuff of international politics. One only has to think back to the Christian charity work that King Leopold II of Belgium professed to be doing in 19th Century Congo to understand why many African observers are feeling a little nervous right now. Paul Robeson once sent a telegram to President Truman in 1946 opining that "Only when our government has taken ... action toward protecting its own citizens can its role in aiding the progress of peoples in other countries be viewed with trust and hope." Were he saying that today he would be no less correct, and no less unpopular with political elites and international business interests. Conditions are ripe for what some call a New Land Grab and Colonisation of Africa, but thanks to those like Robeson who had good reason to distrust governments and say so loud and clear, we can be reminded that it is not just a group of Nigerian girls that are at risk - we all are - if we don't constantly watch all our leaders very carefully, and hold them accountable for their actions towards providing peace, fairness, equality and justice, at home and abroad. I hope you enjoy the show.

Tayo Aluko. Writer, Performer, Producer. Tayo was born in Nigeria, and now lives in Liverpool. He worked previously as an architect and property developer, with a special but as yet frustrated interest in eco-friendly construction. He has fronted orchestras as baritone soloist in concert halls. and has also performed lead roles in such operas and musicals as Nabucco, Kiss Me Kate and Anything Goes. CALL MR ROBESON has won numerous awards at festivals in the UK and Canada, as well as highly favourable reviews in the press - most notably in the Guardian and on BBC Radio 4. He has toured the play around the UK, the United States of America, Canada, Jamaica and Nigeria, and at New York's Carnegie Hall in February 2012 on his 50th birthday. He researched, wrote and narrated to camera a piece on West African History before the Trans-Atlantic Slave Trade, which forms part of the permanent exhibit at Liverpool's International Slavery Museum. His 15minute play, HALF MOON, which also deals with ancient Africa has been performed several times in the UK. He has recently been appointed president of the Birmingham Clarion Singers. He is currently working with The Maltings Theatre, Berwick on a new piece, titled What Happens? featuring the writings of Langston Hughes, to be performed with live jazz accompaniment. He is a current writer on attachment with the Liverpool Everyman and Playhouse theatres.

Nicholas Sykes, Piano and original incidental music. Nicholas currenty lives in Howden. Having retired from teaching two years ago after 33 years as Head of Music in the private sector, his last post being at Clock House School, the prep school for Bradford Grammar School.
