CALL MR. ROBESON: A life, with songs.

Greetings and Welcome. Last Thursday, August 23rd, was Slavery Remembrance Day. Many will be forgiven for not having known that, but in Liverpool, the day is marked annually by the International Slavery Museum, and this year, a crowd followed a Brazilian samba drumming band on a walk through the city to remember the African ancestors captured, lost at sea, and enslaved in the Americas. At the Albert Dock, a libation was offered, and the museum building named after Martin Luther King, Jr. On August 23rd 1791, a slave uprising broke out in St. Domingo, led by one Toussaint L'Ouverture, which thirteen years later resulted in victory for the people of the newly named Haiti. It is in honour of L'Ouverture and those fighters that the day is commemorated internationally. L'Ouverture is not as well known today as he deserves to be, at least here in the UK, but he leaves a great revolutionary legacy. So does Paul Robeson - also somewhat overlooked, but no less deserving of the reverence and honour afforded better known figures of recent history. This is perhaps due to the general perception of him as a revolutionary. The theory that revolutionaries will always be consigned to obscurity falls down when one considers that another revolutionary is perhaps the most famous figure in the history of humankind. His name: Jesus of Nazareth. It may be the violent and dramatic nature of their deaths that makes some revolutionaries more famous than others. Famous or not, all dreamed a better world and effectively communicated that dream to the masses - in words, deed and song, and this set them on a fatal collision course with the powers that be. Still, their dreams live on, and potentially inspire the rest of us to not only dream, but to also act upon that dream in whatever way we can. May we continue to seek out stories of the ordinary and extraordinary heroes of the past and present, celebrate them and keep their dreams alive by joining them in the fight peace, justice and freedom, at whatever personal cost. Tayo Aluko. Writer, Performer, Producer. Tayo was born in Nigeria, and now lives in Liverpool. He worked until recently as an architect and property developer, with a special but as yet frustrated interest in eco-friendly construction. As a baritone, he has sung as soloist in British concert halls accompanied by orchestra, and has also sung in Germany, Ireland and Nigeria. He has performed lead roles in such operas and musicals as Nabucco, Kiss Me Kate and Anything Goes. CALL MR ROBESON won the Argus Angel Award for Artistic Excellence and Best Male Performer Award at the 2008 Brighton Festival Fringe, and two Merit Awards for Excellence in London in 2010. He has performed the play around the UK, the United States of America, Canada and Nigeria, and at New York's Carnegie Hall in February 2012 for his 50th birthday. His other piece titled FROM BLACK AFRICA TO THE WHITE HOUSE: a talk about Black Political Resistance, illustrated with Spirituals has also been performed in three continents. He researched, wrote and narrated to camera a piece on West African History before the Trans-Atlantic Slave Trade, which forms part of the permanent exhibit at Liverpool's International Slavery Museum. Mike started playing piano by ear as child, playing gospel in church and later discovering Jazz, which he went on to study at Liverpool Community College and Leeds college of Music. As well as playing regularly in Jazz festivals round the UK, Mike has toured both coasts of America with Call Mr Robeson. Mike also performs in another two-hander, a Jazz drama *God Bless the Child* about Billie Holliday, in which he also acts. He plays regularly as soloist and with Swing and Function bands at weddings, other celebrations and at corporate events. Mike also teaches piano to aspiring Pop, Blues and Jazz musicians and to singer/song writers.

Olusola Oyeleye, Director and Dramaturge. Olusola is an award winning writer, director and producer working in opera, music theatre, visual arts and dance. She was part of New World Nigeria, the sports and cultural programme organised by the Nigerian Olympic Committee.
