CALL MR. ROBESON: A life, with songs Written and Performed by Tayo Aluko, with Elaine Joe, Piano Evergreen Cultural Centre, Coquitlam, BC, Canada. February 16 - 18, 2017

Greetings, Welcome. For some strange reason, the phrase "Beauty and the Beast" came to mind as I was following coverage of your prime minister's visit to the White House a few days ago. If a world-wide election were held to find the best-looking head of state, Canada would probably stand a better chance of winning than the US. As we have seen recently however, elections can be very strange affairs. We also know that looks aren't everything. While this country has long enjoyed a reputation as a safe haven for refugees from all over the world (the US included) many think there are too many contemporary similarities with your southern neighbours for comfort. This is demonstrated by the fact that one of the topics discussed at the presidential summit was the proposed pipeline taking Tar Sands from Canada right through the US to the Gulf of Mexico, with all the ensuing environmental and social damage that will be caused en route. Many wonder if and when the scenes that played out at Standing Rock, where the state has shown no hesitation in violently suppressing opposition to the Dakota Access Pipeline, will be repeated on this side of the border. That was always likely in the time of your former prime minister, but handsome as he and his cabinet may be, and notwithstanding his election promises, many worry that your current prime minister is also showing signs of favouring profitable trade with the Canadian and American oil interests over the environment and people, and that the advance of capitalist exploitation is safe under this administration. This increases the possibility of violence as First Nations communities, mainstream environmentalists and all manner of protesters from all over the country continue to gather to stand in opposition to the pipeline. This will show an uglier face of Canada to the world than that we are currently presented with, and one can only have admiration for those who are brave enough to sacrifice the comfort of an easy life to voice their dissent in all weathers. Nobody did this more remarkably than Paul Robeson, known more for his art than for his activism on behalf of his people and all oppressed people of the world. It is almost certain that if he were around today, he would be adding his voice to the protests on both sides of the border, embodying and representing in the process the most beautiful of people in both countries. I hope you enjoy the show.

Tayo Aluko. Writer, Performer. Tayo was born in Nigeria, and now lives in England, having worked previously as an architect and property developer. He has fronted orchestras as baritone soloist in concert halls, and has also performed lead roles in operas and musicals. *CALL MR ROBESON* has won numerous awards at festivals in the UK and Canada. He delivers a lecture/concert called *PAUL ROBESON – THE GIANT, IN A NUTSHELL*. Another one titled *FROM BLACK AFRICA TO THE WHITE HOUSE*: a talk about Black Political Resistance, illustrated with spirituals has been performed in three continents. He researched, wrote and narrated to camera a piece on West African History before the Trans-Atlantic Slave Trade, which forms part of the permanent exhibit at Liverpool's International Slavery Museum. His 15-minute play, *HALF MOON*, which also deals with ancient Africa has been performed the writings of African American Langston Hughes, for performance with live jazz accompaniment. His new play *JUST AN ORDINARY LAWYER* premièred at the Edinburgh Fringe in August 2016 and received its Canadian and international première in Victoria, BC in early February 2017.

Elaine Joe (Piano) Elaine Joe started playing piano at the tender age of 4. She studied with the Royal Conservatory and played competitively. Since then, she's studied Popular and Blues piano. Throughout her career, she's played with singers, accordion ensembles, choirs and in a band. Elaine works as a performer, teacher, composer and an accompanist. She plays for four choirs ranging from a mental health choir to a Ukrainian one. As the choirs are rather eclectic, she has an interesting repertoire of Folk, World, Broadway, Jazz and Popular tunes. In her spare time, she performs with an accordion squeezebox circle, dances and plays djembe on the beach and is learning cello. Away from the music, she can be found on the mountain snowboarding, x-country skiing or rollerblading in the summer. She has a passion for treehouses and sometimes practices in the trees.

Olusola Oyeleye, Director and Dramaturge. Olusola is an award-winning writer, director and producer working in opera, music theatre, visual arts and dance.
